Mental Health in the jails has become a full time job. Correctional Health Services (CHS) has one counselor and two nurses that are in charge of all the mental health services. One Psychiatrist and one Nurse Practitioner are part time. By tracking this measure CHS will be able to show the ratio of mental health patients/inmates to our licensed professionals. This also assists with knowing who is coming into the jails with what disorders so that trainings and conferences that pertain to one disorder or another can be attended and new ideas to assist patients/ inmates can be researched.

June's number's of 88% or 91 out of 103 are adding up to be average for the year. It should be noted, patients residing in the Pinal County Jail are, for the most part, in the jail a short period of time. Throughout the year, the mental health program has worked in conjunction with other agencies to help with discharge planning. This includes assisting with transportation if necessary to outside agencies including home if needed. The staff have worked hard to continue building the program.

CORRECTIONAL HEALTH

Correctional Health Services incorporates a Chronic Care Program into the department. This program is meant to closely monitor inmates with certain conditions to provide education and health care while they are incarcerated in order to make their activities of daily living better. Correctional Health Services ensures the patient (inmate) has the tools he/she needs to ensure they can keep themselves healthy when released from jail.

It is not easy to complete the tasks involved with the Chronic Care Program because most of the patients who are seen have not taken care of themselves when they were out in the community.

There were 2 inmates whose conditions were under poor control out of 38 patients for the month of June. While Correctional Health Services strives to improve every person with Chronic Care conditions, it is just not realistic. There are many factors that can be involved with the patient so that says a lot when no patient has made poor strides to get better.

It is also the inmate's responsibility to monitor themselves when they are in jail as well. For instance, if an inmate has diabetes and orders a bunch of sugar from the canteen every day, it is very hard for the medical unit to keep that person from being at risk for issues associated with the diabetes.

CHS will continue to measure this as it is important to monitor what kinds of diseases and disorders come into the jail so staff are well equipped to handle any situation.

CHS will continue to monitor this measure for the next fiscal year. Overall, most patients did well in assisting with monitoring their chronic care conditions.
