Vision

Pinal County Government provides progressive and proactive leadership in the areas of economic development, state-of-the-art technologies, growth management, and public services to promote healthy and safe communities.

COUNTY MISSION

Pinal County Government protects and enhances its citizens' quality of life by providing public services in an ethical, efficient, and responsible manner delivered by a motivated, skilled, and courteous workforce.

DEPARTMENT MISSION

The mission of the Adult Probation Department is to provide assessment and supervision services for offenders so they can experience positive behavior change leading to the restoration of victims and safer communities.

ISSUE STATEMENTS

Issue 1 – Increased Demands/Mandates for Services

The population growth in Pinal County correlates to a higher demand for probation services. In addition, there is a continuation of legislative mandates and administrative requirements without the appropriate increases in resources to meet these changes. If these issues are not addressed, the following will result:

- An increase in crimes committed by probationers
- A decrease in public safety
- An increase in the prison population

Issue 2 – Specialized Supervision

There is increasing evidence that specialized supervision of specific populations (i.e. sex offenders, domestic violence offenders, drug offenders, and those with mental health issues) results in a greater opportunity for positive behavior change and an increase in community safety. The continuing need to reduce caseload size in order to provide specialized supervision will, if not addressed, result in:

- An increase in probation violations

- A decrease in public safety
- An increase in victimization rates

Issue 3 - Probationer Rehabilitation Infrastructure

The continuing lack of appropriate levels of community infrastructure to support probationer rehabilitation (which includes treatment resources, halfway houses, educational services, public transportation, employment resources, and community work service providers) will, if not addressed, result in:

- A decreased likelihood that probationers will be re-integrated into society
- An increased likelihood that probationers will not complete probation successfully
- An increased inability to enforce court orders
- An increase in the likelihood of community work service not being completed

STRATEGIC GOALS

Strategic Goal 1 - Reduce Recidivism Rates (Issues #1, 2, 3)

By end of FY 2016-2017, the residents of Pinal County will benefit from public safety being enhanced through a reduction in recidivism as evidenced by 70% of probationers successfully completing probation.

Strategic Goal 2 – Increase Effectiveness of Probation Services (Issues #2, 3)

Pinal County probationers will benefit from more effective probation services by receiving appropriate evidenced based interventions resulting in positive behavior changes as demonstrated by:

- By end of FY2016-2017, 60% of probationers will successfully complete financial restitution to their victims
- By end of FY2016-2017, 80% of probationers will not be committed to prison during their probationary period

Strategic Goal 3 – Probationer Treatment and Education (Issues #1, 3)

The Pinal County probationers will benefit by receiving timely treatment services that meet their needs as evidenced by:

- By end of FY2016-2017, 99% of probationers being referred to services will be referred within 30 days after the identification of need
- By end of FY2016-2017, 81% of probationers will successfully complete treatment

Result Measures

- 1. 66% of probationers will successfully complete their probation**
Successful completion is defined as not terminating probation by being sentenced to either prison or jail.
(**Formula:** the number of probationers who successfully complete their probation divided by the total number of probationers discharged during the reporting period)
- 2. 72% of probationers will not be committed to prison during their probation term**
(**Formula:** the number of probationers not committed to prison during their probation term divided by the total number of probationers discharged for prison eligible offenses during the reporting period)
- 3. 77% of probationers will be arrested within 90 days of the issue date of their warrant**
(**Formula:** the number of probationers arrested within 90 days of the issue date of their warrant divided by the number of probationers arrested within 90 days of the issue date of the warrant plus the total number of warrants transferred to the warrants caseload)

Output Measures

1. 1600 probationers supervised
This output estimate reflects the average number of probationers supervised
2. 500 probation violation warrants filed

Successful completion is defined as not permanently exiting the Intensive Probation Supervision program by being sentenced to either prison or jail.

(Formula: the number of people who successfully complete the Intensive Probation Supervision program divided by the total number of people who permanently exit the Intensive Probation Supervision program)

2. **50% of exiting program participants will successfully complete the Drug Court program**

Successful completion is defined as program graduation

(**Formula:** the number of people who successfully complete the Drug Court program divided by the total number of people who permanently exit the Drug Court program)

1. 148 Domestic Violence Court participants that were provided enhanced probation services (supervision and treatment)
2. 110 Drug Court participants that were provided enhanced probation services (supervision and treatment)

(Formula: the number of probationers who successfully complete treatment divided by the number of probationers discharged)

- 3. 85% of probationers in Moral Reconciliation Therapy will successfully complete the program**

(Formula: the number of probationers that graduate the program divided by the total number of probationers exiting the program)

(Formula: the number of probationers who have a restitution balance outstanding and made at least a partial restitution payment during the reporting period divided by the total number of probationers that owed restitution during the reporting period)

- 2. 60% of probationers will successfully complete financial restitution to their victim(s) by the termination of their probation**

(Formula: the number of probationers who successfully complete financial restitution to their victims by the termination of their probation divided by the total number of probationers terminated from probation that owed restitution)

- 3. 60% of probationers will perform community work service during the reporting period**

(Formula: the number of probationers that performed community work service divided by the total number of probationers ordered to complete community work service)

Output Measures

1. 200 probationers ordered to make monthly restitution payments during the reporting period
2. 225 probationers ordered to complete community work service during the reporting period

(**Formula:** the number of presentence reports filed with the court within 2 business days prior to the hearing date without a continuance requested by the Adult Probation Department divided by the number of presentence reports filed with the court)

1. 550 Presentence investigations/reports provided to the court
2. 1600 Early Disposition Reports provided to the court

Result Measures

- 1. 80% of supervised defendants will not be charged with a new offense during pretrial supervision**
(Formula: the number of defendants on pretrial supervision who are not charged with a new offense divided by the total number of defendants on pretrial supervision.)
- 2. 85% of supervised pretrial defendants will not fail to appear for scheduled court hearings**
(Formula: the number of pretrial defendants discharged for failure to appear divided by the number of defendants discharged from pretrial supervision)
- 3. 80% of defendants successfully completing pretrial services**
(Formula: the number of defendants successfully completing pretrial services divided by the number of defendants discharged from pretrial services supervision during the reporting period)

Output Measures

1. 140 criminal histories reviewed for new criminal activity
2. 70 defendants provided pretrial supervision on a monthly basis
