

AGENCY AGREEMENT

This LeadsOnline, Inc. AGENCY AGREEMENT ("Agreement"), dated July 15, 2012, is made between Pinal County AZ Sheriff's Office ("County") and LeadsOnline LLC ("Leads").

SCOPE OF AGREEMENT

Leads operates and maintains at its web site a confidential investigations system accessible electronically exclusively by Law Enforcement Agencies for the sole purpose of identifying merchandise and/or persons suspected to have been involved in crimes.

County desires to utilize the electronic system to support its investigations.

Subject to the terms of this Agreement and in consideration of the mutual covenants stated below, the parties agree as follows:

I.

DEFINITIONS

- 1.1 "Authorized Officials" means duly authorized law enforcement personnel of County.
- 1.2 "Data" includes but is not limited to the ticket number, item number, make, model, property description and serial number of merchandise sold to a Dealer or used as loan collateral by a Secondhand Dealer, and other non-public personal information pertaining to any customer(s) involved in the aforementioned transactions (including for example, customers' names, addresses, identification numbers and any images collected by Dealer during course of a transaction).
- 1.3 "Law Enforcement Agency" means any municipal, county, state or federal government staffed and operated agency whose primary purpose is criminal investigation and/or law enforcement.
- 1.4 "Secondhand Dealer" means any person or entity that purchases pre-owned personal property other than Scrap Metal and/or uses personal property as loan collateral and furnishes Data relative thereto to Leads for inclusion in Leads' database.
- 1.5 "Scrap Metal Dealer" means any person or entity that purchases ferrous or nonferrous metal that is no longer used for its original purpose and is capable of being processed for reuse by a metal recycling facility, and furnishes Data relative thereto to Leads for inclusion in Leads' database.
- 1.6 "Scrap Metal" includes materials purchased by Scrap Metal Dealers including but not limited to iron, brass, wire, cable, copper, bronze, aluminum, platinum, lead, solder, steel, catalytic converters.

- 1.7 "Dealer" means Secondhand Dealer and/or Scrap Metal Dealer as specified in Attachment "A". If either Secondhand Dealer or Scrap Metal Dealer is not specified in Attachment "A", only the specified Dealer type will apply.

II.

APPOINTMENT

- 2.1 Subject to the terms of this Agreement, County hereby appoints Leads as its agent, as such term is utilized in the Gramm-Leach-Bliley Act of 1999 (the "GLBA"), for the sole purpose of collecting, maintaining and disseminating Data from Dealers. This agency appointment is effective as of the registration date of County's initial user.

III.

AGREEMENTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF COUNTY

- 3.1 County agrees that County's use of the Data displayed at Leads' web site will be for the purpose of identifying stolen merchandise and/or persons suspected of involvement in crimes.
- 3.2 County agrees to not divulge Data or information obtained through County's access to Leads' web site to anyone other than Authorized Officials and persons with County's agency entitled to receive the Data or information pursuant to statute, rule or regulation, including specifically the GLBA.
- 3.3 County agrees to not access information from Leads' web site for purposes of gathering information from outside of County's jurisdiction for any third party, including private parties and other law enforcement agencies.
- 3.4 County agrees that passwords provided by Leads to County enabling County to utilize Leads' web site will be made known only to Authorized Officials of County and that only those Authorized Officials will be permitted to use the passwords or otherwise access the electronic system at Leads' web site. County will notify Leads when Authorized Officials leave the agency, change duties, or are otherwise no longer authorized to access Leads' investigations system.
- 3.5 County agrees not to use the Data or Information displayed at Leads' web site for any unlawful purpose, or in any manner, which may create liability for Leads or Dealers. County agrees its use of the Data or Information contained at Leads' web site will not be other than as permitted by law or the rights duly granted to County in carrying out County's official duties.
- 3.6 County agrees to act in accordance with laws and procedures within Dealer's jurisdiction, and agrees to notify the designated Law Enforcement Agency for Dealer's jurisdiction prior to requesting additional information about Data, to place an item on hold status, or to confiscate an item found in a business outside of County's jurisdiction.

- 3.7 County agrees to submit accurate information, including but not limited to valid identity of Authorized Officials establishing accounts to access the system and County case numbers for specific items and/or suspects in conducting any search or use of Leads' web site.
- 3.8 County agrees it has no ownership rights to any password or user name that may be utilized by County pursuant to this Agreement. For security purposes, County agrees to change its password(s) every 90 days.
- 3.9 County is responsible for insuring that County's hardware can connect to Leads' website via the Internet.
- 3.10 County is responsible for insuring compliance among businesses in County's jurisdiction. County agrees to not discourage Dealers from furnishing Data to Leads.

IV.

AGREEMENTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF LEADS

- 4.1 Leads agrees to operate and maintain an electronic Investigations system at its web site for the purpose of receiving and disseminating Data from Dealers for the use of Law Enforcement Agencies.
- 4.2 Leads agrees to provide system capabilities in accordance with Attachment "A" attached to this Agreement.
- 4.3 Leads agrees to implement commercially reasonable efforts to maintain County's access to Leads' web site. From time to time, maintenance will be required to be performed, as well as developments and modifications to Leads' web site and on Leads' infrastructure. County acknowledges that Leads has no responsibility for the service or operation of the Internet or for County's ability to connect to the Internet, and that Leads makes no representations in this regard. Internet service is subject to limitations caused by local landlines, atmospheric or technical conditions and may be temporarily unavailable, limited, interrupted or curtailed.
- 4.4 Leads agrees to facilitate County's access to the Data by passwords and user names selected by County within reasonable parameters established by Leads.
- 4.5 Leads agrees to provide County with secure access to a report detailing the usage of Leads' web site by Authorized Officials.
- 4.6 Leads' client support and training is available to County at no additional cost when performed by telephone or email between the hours of 7:30 AM and 5:30 PM Central Time. County may request Leads to travel to County's location for specialized training and support. Special services including after-hours support and on-site training may be provided upon mutual agreement, and may include rates for time, materials, travel, and miscellaneous expenses as agreed upon by the parties.



We are delighted to submit our scope of services and fee for the feasibility study for the expansion of the Pinal County 911 facility. Per discussion in our recent meeting at Pinal County, please find our proposal below.

Project Understanding

Pinal County seeks to study the feasibility of expanding their existing 911 area that is located on the 3rd floor of the Pinal County Sheriff's Office. The area to be studied is currently a roof area that adjoins the 911 Dispatch along its North and East sides. There is approximately 1,850 sf of space available to expand into. To test the feasibility of this concept Gensler proposes the following steps be accomplished:

Existing Building Assessment (week 1)

Our team of Architects and Engineers will perform the following studies:

- Verify the existing roof and foundation systems are capable of supporting the new loads imposed by this new addition.
- Analyze the existing building electrical systems looking for the most reliable and efficient method to support the new loads.
- Analyze the existing building mechanical systems looking for the most reliable and efficient method to support the new spaces.
- Analyze the existing domestic water piping and sanitary drain system and test its capability to support additional fixture units needed by any new restrooms.

These studies will be based on existing As-Built Documents as well as any previous capacity studies the County may have done. We have not included the cost for detailed data gathering as would be obtained in a full test and balance study. Our goal will be to look for

unused existing capacities, methods for tying into the existing systems, as well as the best method to expand or build dedicated new systems supporting the new space.

Deliverable: summary report of existing building assessment that generally define the scope of existing systems improvements associated with the expansion project.

Programming and Space Planning (week 2 and week 3)

Our team will provide one meeting with key user representatives to understand the function of all existing areas, existing deficiencies in functional areas, areas requiring growth, and new functions not currently in the operation. Based on these discussions we will prepare a space summary of the existing space as well as the new spaces required. The summary will include the net usable areas required as well as a factor for circulation. The space summary will be subtotaled by functional area. Any new mechanical, electrical, or IT space will also be programmed such that the total programmed area will match all of the space needed for a fully functional facility. Adjacency diagrams will be developed to describe key adjacency requirements.

Deliverable: Space Summary spreadsheet identifying each space type, quantity of spaces, square footage of each space type and factor for circulation. Adjacency diagrams will be developed to describe the relationship of key program elements.

The adjacency diagrams will then be used to develop space plans for the existing and the new areas. The space plans will be to scale and will include a layout of the generic furniture needed to achieve the functional program requirements. The space plans will then be reviewed with County management for review, revision as required and approval. The plans will include a demolition diagram of existing building systems and elements. Simple exterior elevations of the new additions will also be developed. Pinal County is to provide Gensler electronic CAD files of the existing building prior to initiation of Programming. The Mechanical, Electrical, and Structural systems needed, will be developed through narratives to depict system types, sizes, and quality level. Gensler will work with County staff to determine equipment and console requirements, and costs for the selected equipment. We will also develop a furniture layout including the 911 dispatch consoles. From this layout a furniture budget will be developed for use in the overall project budget.

Deliverable: Opinion of probable cost for the equipment and furnishings.

Schedule (week 3)

A project schedule will be developed using Microsoft Project software. It will include expected design periods, including Pinal review times, Council/Board review and approval times, construction durations and equipment/furniture installation durations. The schedule will include key interfaces with the existing 911 operation as may be required if the project needs to be phased.

Deliverable: Project Schedule using Microsoft Project software.

Presentation (week 4)

A PowerPoint presentation will be developed to help explain the justification for the project. We will work with Pinal County staff to document the "statistical" requirements such as population, past call statistics, and comparisons to other Counties of similar size. The Programming needs will be summarized on a slide including any specific challenges to be addressed in the expansion. Slides will be developed showing our recommendation for the proposed floor plan, furniture arrangement, and a summary of major MEP concepts. We will also include an overall project Budget slide as well as the proposed Project Schedule.

Deliverable: PowerPoint Presentation that will include each of the deliverables listed above.

What should I expect?





I am requesting a check in the amount of \$5,000 of PCSO RICO funds (Cost Center 2469) to HonorVet.org. The Pinal County Sheriff's Office has partnered with HonorVet.org to assist in the support of numerous military personnel in the Sheriff's Office and throughout Pinal County who suffer from PTSD and has affected their family life, mental health, job performance and re-integration into our community. Some veteran's turn to drugs, alcohol and destructive behaviors, rather than seek the help and support that would help restore them to a healthier lifestyle.

Recently, we have had armed stand offs, DUI's and Domestic Violence calls involving returning military veterans. Clearly, the inability to cope or lack of adequate resources remains contributing factors in this ongoing affect. The Sheriff's Office fully understands that we can be reactive, or pro-active. We shall be pro-active, not only because it is in our interest, but because we have a responsibility to our returning heroes – many of whom are our employees and residents.

The program reaches at risk military veterans and shall result in reduction in crime, suicide and calls for service. I have been working closely with HonorVet.org and know that they serve a critical link between returning veterans and the crucial support they need to reintegrate into their family, community and workplace. To create a safe and trusted environment for Veterans, Service Members and their loved ones by making available an array of services dedicated to enhancing their overall well-being.

As part of HonorVet.org's commitment to be The Next Generation Community for Veterans, they're working with experts in a variety of fields to develop custom support systems, leverage existing resources, and organize information across a wide spectrum so that our members have a one-stop shop of support, benefits and friendship.

The need to provide assistance to Veterans and Service Members is critical, yet these same men and women are deeply inculcated in the values of discipline, pride and toughness, and often find it difficult, if not impossible, to ask for help when they sincerely need it. The statistics speak for themselves.

- The number of service members discharged specifically for mental health reasons is up 64 percent from 2005 to 2009.
- The unemployment rate for returning veterans hit 21.1% in March of 2010
- According to *USA Today*, the Army reported suicides were at a record high in June 2010.
- More than 60 percent of Service Members report receiving some kind of mental health care since returning from Iraq or Afghanistan. More than 5 percent of recently returning Service Members showed signs of significant mental health problems.
- Even more alarming, when these same Service Members were reevaluated 3-6 months later, up to 40 percent exhibited signs of severe emotional distress.
- According to a recent report by the Department of Veterans Affairs, an average of 18 Veterans commit suicide everyday.

Many feel ashamed or worry it could adversely affect other areas of their lives to try and find assistance. Furthermore, others live in smaller communities not equipped to provide specialized services. HonorVet.org is a safe, private and confidential place to turn for help no matter when, where or how Veterans, Service Members and their loved ones need a hand.

APPENDIX C:

Guidelines for Determining a Community-Based Program's Eligibility

To ensure that recipient law enforcement agencies administer these guidelines for determining a community-based program's eligibility in accordance with the federal law and Department of Justice policy, an agency's chief law enforcement officer must ensure his or her agency's adherence to the following requirements governing eligibility, background, and compliance of applicants to be eligible to benefit from shared funds. The federal investigating agencies and the United States Attorney's Offices also are tasked with helping to ensure applicants' suitability to receive guidelines for shared funds use expenditures. Once completed, the chief law enforcement officer's certification that an applicant is eligible to benefit from shared funds will remain effective for one year.

I. Eligibility

For an applicant to benefit from permissible use expenditures, the chief law enforcement officer shall determine that the applicant fulfills the following eligibility requirements:

A. Type of Entity

The applicant must be either:

- (1) a state, county, or local governmental department or agency; or
- (2) a private, nonprofit organization, pursuant to 26 U.S.C. § 501(c)(3) or (4).

B. Activity of Entity

The applicant also must be primarily engaged in providing a program that is both:

- (1) community-based; and
- (2) supportive of and consistent with a law enforcement effort, policy, or initiative.

Such programs include, but are not limited to, the following:

- (1) drug abuse treatment;
- (2) drug and crime prevention education;
- (3) providing housing; or
- (4) providing job skills.

In order to assist chief law enforcement officers in determining whether a potential recipient of benefits under the guidelines for supporting community-based programs with shared funds is eligible,

the Department of Justice provides the following non-exclusive list of examples of activities that it has approved in the past as qualifying to benefit from equitable sharing:

- (1) establish a detoxification center;
- (2) fund a Police Athletic League's "Summer Playstreets" program for crime and drug prevention;
- (3) fund a city parks department's anti-gang initiative;
- (4) fund "Law Enforcement Explorer Posts," a Boy Scouts program promoting law enforcement training and community service;
- (5) fund a "Crime Stoppers" program providing reward money and assistance to neighborhood watch groups including training on observance and effective witness skills;
- (6) purchase a computer for teaching job skills and drug and alcohol awareness to probationers;
- (7) fund programs for incarcerated youth, parents of murdered children, and domestic violence victims; and
- (8) fund a methadone clinic.

Considering each of these approved activities, the Department of Justice based its approval on the activity's nexus to a law enforcement interest, whether:

- (1) direct (e.g., paying rewards for key information);
- (2) preventative (e.g., funding a methadone clinic, drug awareness program, anti-gang initiative, and probationer training); or
- (3) developmental in promoting community policing (e.g., incorporating law enforcement awareness in a Boy Scout program).

II. Background and Compliance with Law and Policy

A. Certification by Applicant

An applicant for benefits to support community-based programs with shared funds must certify in writing the following aspects of its background and compliance with federal law and Department of Justice guidelines:

- (1) The applicant fulfills the basic eligibility requirements set forth in parts I.A and B above.
- (2) The applicant agrees:
 - a. to account separately for all guidelines for shared funds use benefits received; and
 - b. to subject such accounting to the standard accounting requirements and practices employed under state or local law for recipients of federal, state, or local funds.

- (3) The applicant is in compliance with the federal civil rights laws.
- (4) The applicant is in compliance with federal laws that apply to the applicant.
- (5) No officer, director, trustee, or fiduciary of the applicant has been:
 - a. convicted of a felony offense under federal or state law; or
 - b. convicted of any drug offense.
- (6) No shared benefits will be used for political or personal purposes.
- (7) No shared benefits will be used for any purpose that would constitute an improper or illegal use under the laws, rules, regulations, or orders of the state or local jurisdiction in which the applicant is located or operates.

The applicant's certification must be signed by the head of the applicant entity and must be submitted to the chief law enforcement officer who will approve expenditures on the applicant's behalf. The chief law enforcement officer shall maintain this certification as a record as long as the applicant may benefit from shared funds, and thereafter, for as long as the chief law enforcement officer is required to maintain records under applicable state or local laws or regulations.

Any applicant that cannot certify its compliance with number 5 above (criminal record of principals) should provide the chief law enforcement officer with a detailed explanation of the aspects in which, and the reasons why, certification is not possible. A chief law enforcement officer who wishes to provide support to an applicant that cannot certify compliance with number 5 above shall provide an explanation for his or her position, along with a copy of the applicant's explanation, as an attachment to the law enforcement agency's Form DAG-71 (Application of Transfer of Federally Forfeited Property) to the Asset Forfeiture and Money Laundering Section (AFMLS), Criminal Division, Department of Justice. AFMLS will make the final decision on whether the provision of guidelines for shared funds use benefits is appropriate.

An applicant for benefits under these guidelines that cannot certify the other aspects of its background and compliance with federal law and Department of Justice guidelines (numbers 1-4, 6 and 7 above) will be denied guidelines for shared funds use benefits.

B. Statement by Chief Law Enforcement Officer

The chief law enforcement officer shall explain in writing why the applicant's receipt of permissible use benefits for the particular activity or use is supportive of and consistent with a law enforcement effort, policy, and/or initiative within the guidelines to support community-based programs. The chief law enforcement officer also shall maintain this written statement as a record as specified in section II.A above.

C. Inquiry by the Chief Law Enforcement Officer

A chief law enforcement officer is also responsible for determining whether an applicant for benefits under these guidelines or its principals (e.g., officer, director, trustee, or fiduciary) currently is the subject of federal, state, or local criminal investigation. Accordingly, a chief law enforcement officer shall:

- (1) utilize all investigative resources available (e.g., National Crime Information Computer) to determine the applicant's status and provide the findings to the federal investigative agency on the Form DAG-71; and
- (2) fully identify the applicant and its principals on the Form DAG-71.

D. Inquiry by the Federal Investigating Agency

The federal investigative agency that receives the Form DAG-71 shall use the information identifying the applicant and its principals to conduct further checks of whether the applicant or its principals currently are the subject of a federal, state, or local criminal investigation. The federal investigative agency also shall provide this identifying information to the United States Attorney in the district where the applicant is located, and where the applicant is operating, and to the chief law enforcement officer involved (unless non-disclosure is required to safeguard a federal investigation in progress).

E. Inquiry by the United States Attorney

The United States Attorney in the district where an applicant or one of its principals is located, or where it or one of its principals is operating, shall determine whether the applicant or principal currently is the subject of grand jury proceedings or other prosecutorial scrutiny in that district, and the United States Attorney shall notify the federal investigative agency of the findings, and also shall notify the chief law enforcement officer involved (unless non-disclosure is required by federal law or to safeguard a federal investigation in progress).



I am the instrumental music director for Apache Junction High School and oversee the feeder programs from our elementary(s) through junior high. We have always tried to provide as many musical opportunities as possible whether performing, or attending concerts for students enrolled in the Arts.

Because of the hard economic times our high school Wind Ensemble and Jazz lab have not participated in performance festivals outside of the state for the last five years. We have decided this year to try to go to the Nationally Adjudicated Heritage Festivals in California.
