Libraries and the USA Patriot Act

I recently attended the annual AzLA Regional Forum held at the historic Hassayampa Inn in Prescott. The day began with an interesting and informative overview of the USA Patriot Act and the broad authority it has given law enforcement agencies to obtain business records – including library records. Leah Sandwell-Weiss, a reference librarian at the University of Arizona’s law library, spoke for about an hour. She covered the history of the USA Patriot Act, which was signed into law October 26, 2001, the impact it has had on ordinary citizens, and how it has changed the way many libraries do business. Next on the agenda was a panel discussion and we all settled in to hear more about the USA Patriot Act. The three panelist were: 1) Leah Sandwell-Weiss, law librarian, 2) Eleanor Eisenberg, Executive Director of the Arizona Civil Liberties Union, and 3) Gail Thackeray, Assistant Attorney General, Technology Crimes, Arizona Attorney General’s Office. All three panelists have law de-

grees and each has considerable experience in their respective professions. A few questions were prepared in advance and we were encouraged to write a question as the session progressed. The panel members were given two minutes to respond to each question with the moderator asking the first question.

Eleanor spoke first, passionately detailing ways in which the USA Patriot Act has undermined our civil liberties, citing examples of people who have been investigated and arrested for no good reason. Gail was equally passionate about the responsibility of law enforcement to protect citizens, citing examples of pedophiles and stalkers using library computers to commit crimes. Leah, the only librarian on the panel, was sitting between them responding to each question in her own quiet manner.

Gail and Eleanor continued to fervently defended their point of view, each quoting the constitution, citing examples and making disparaging remarks about the other’s viewpoint. It wasn’t long before the audience began to participate with one person applauding a point made by Gail and another

saying “Thank you!” in response to an opposing point made by Eleanor. Gail and Eleanor didn’t pull any punches, often using a portion of their two minutes as a rebuttal to the other. At one point Eleanor stated, “It’s obvious we both know the Constitution, we just read it differently.”

The session ended with “dueling websites.” Gail and Eleanor quickly naming off websites which promoted their point of view. Everyone was invigorated by the debate. Lynn Garner, the presenter of our afternoon session on Ethical Fitness, began with this opening remark, “Those are some strong women! If I’m ever in trouble I know who I’m going to call.” Someone called out, “Which one?” and she replied, “It depends on what kind of trouble I’m in!” Laughter rippled throughout the room.

The USA Patriot Act has made some fundamental changes in law enforcement’s investigative procedures that directly affects libraries, librarians and patrons. In response to these changes, the American Library Association, on January 29, 2003

Red Cross Babysitting Workshop

This 2 day workshop will be presented by a certified Red Cross instructor on Thursday, May 29th from 8:30 a.m. to 12 noon and Friday, May 30 from 8:30 a.m. to 12 noon for students aged 11 to 16 years. Cataloging Corner

This month I would like to address matching a book to a record. I will be using 'match points', which are numbers 1 to 8 below. When you pick up a book and want to add it to your collection, the first thing you ought to do is open it up to the verso of the title page, also know as the "T.p. verso". This is usually the page behind the title page, and on it you can usually find your ISBN number and your Library of Congress Control number (LCCN). The next thing to do will be to search your own database for one of those numbers. If you find a matching record (or even more than one match), then it is time to check your match points.

1. Check that the title is exactly the same.
2. Check the ISBNs and the LCCN that appear in the record – they ought to appear in your book, also, but if they don't it is not a reason to reject the record.
3. Check the General Material Designation. This is found in the record just after the title. For a regular print book, there is none, but for a large print book you might see [text (large print)]. If you see that, make sure that

your book IS a large print. If you see [videorecording], [sound recording], [electronic resource], etc., that is NOT a match to a book.

4. Check the author. If the author is different, make sure that the name in the record is also on your book—it might be the photographer, or a joint author, that is okay.
5. Check the edition statement. This will be a numbered edition; i.e., 1st ed., 1999 ed., etc. If the edition in the record is different from the one on your book, you do not have a match.
6. Check the publisher. Again, if the publisher in the record is completely different from that in your book, you do not have a match; however, sometimes a large publishing house will have 'imprints' and you might only find it on the T.p. verso. An example is: New American Library is on the title page, Signet is in the record and on the T.p. verso is says "A Signet book" and "Signet is an imprint of the New American Library". That is okay to match.
7. Check the date. Since this can be quite difficult to determine, if the date

in the record is also in your book somewhere, it is okay. If you cannot find the date in the record anywhere in your book, it is probably not a match.

8. Check the pagination. Your book should match very closely the number of pages and centimeters in the record, UNLESS it is a paperback reprint. Then it might be 30 pages different and very different centimeters. It still might be okay to use if the date and publisher is the same.

One important point to remember: if in doubt, don't use the record. Find another record that matches exactly. When you search for another matching record using GuiCat, BookWhere, ITS for Windows or your own system's Z39.50 protocol, use these same match points to try to match your book to a record.

Don't forget, I will be happy to answer any questions or help with any problem records.

Remember, the MARC record is the engine that gives staff and patrons the tools needed to search the catalog.

adopted a "Resolution on the USA Patriot Act and Related Matters that Infringe on the Rights of Library Users." A number of library systems throughout the country have approved similar resolutions. The AzLA executive board is meeting this month to decide on its response. Hawaii has become the first state whose legislative body has passed a joint resolution condemning and calling for a repeal of the USA Patriot Act. Visit the ALA's Office of Intellectual Freedom and the ACLU websites for more information. The American Library Association is also supporting legislation introduced by Rep. Bernie Sanders (I-VT). The bill, known as the Freedom to Read Protection Act, would exempt libraries and booksellers from certain provisions of the Patriot Act in order to protect the right to read and access information without governmental intrusion or monitoring.

In response to the USA Patriot Act, Santa Cruz libraries have posted this notice: Warning: Although the Santa Cruz Library

makes every effort to protect your privacy, under the federal USA Patriot Act (Public Law 107-56), records of the books and other materials you borrow from this library may be obtained by federal agents. That federal law prohibits library workers from informing you if federal agents have obtained records about you. Questions about policy should be directed to Attorney General John Ashcroft, Department of Justice, Washington D.C. 20530." Not all librarians agree that this is an appropriate response to the USA Patriot Act. Whether your conscience leads you to follow the letter of the law, engage in civil disobedience or somewhere in between, the panelists all agreed you should bear in mind these important points - know the law, be prepared, and fully understand the consequences of your actions. Advise your attorney of your concerns and contact him when confronted with a subpoena or search

warrant. Revise your library's policies to directly address these issues. Train everyone working or volunteering in your library so they can respond quickly and appropriately should law enforcement come knocking on your door.
